Research:

A number of theorists and behaviourists highlight the importance of play as a developmental stage for all learners. Some significant research by Vygotsky and Piaget can be drawn on to support the importance of play.

Play does not become a focus to replace the need for structured and explicit learning in Reading, Writing and Maths in fact it supports the development of these foundations.
