

Student Learning Conferences

One of our learning principles is to build 'learner agency' - which means that learners know why they are learning something, where they are at and what they need to work on next. Recent research around deep learning suggests that:

" If the focus is to be kept on learning, and the ownership of the learning with the child, then the best person to talk about the learning is the learner"

"Not only is the student the best person to tell their parents what they have learnt, but if we believe that students build their knowledge by communicating what they know, then providing an opportunity for students to tell their family what they know can significantly assist with that learning" (Absolum, 2006)

In committing to this principle, we hope to increase the involvement of students through student-led conferences and building their capacity to reflect on and confidently share and celebrate their learning with you.

What are Student Led Conferences?

A student-led conference is a learning conversation run by the student for his/her parents whilst being supported by his/her learning coach The conference is entirely focused on the student's most recent learning and achievement, and highlights our belief that there is a clear link between a student's ability to talk about their learning and the actual progress they make.

Our Student-led Conferences will take place in Week 8 this term. You will be sent a link in Week 6 to book a 30-minute conference with your child. There will also be time within this 30-minute timeframe for you to speak directly with a learning coach about your child's progress and achievement against the curriculum levels.

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School Trustee Elections

What is a school board of trustees?

Almost all state and state integrated schools in New Zealand have a board of trustees. School board membership includes parent representatives, a staff representative, a student representative (where there are students above year 9) and the principal. Your board may also include other types of trustees. Contact your school for more information on the composition of your school's board.

Who can become a trustee?

Parents, caregivers and people from the wider community can put their name forward to be on a school board during the board of trustee elections.

What do trustees do?

The board is accountable to its parents and community and for student progress and achievement.

Here are some specific things a board does:

Sets the strategic direction and plans for the school and monitors the school's progress against them. Monitors and evaluates student progress.

Oversees the management of staff, property, finances, curriculum and administration.

Ensures that the educational needs and aspirations of Maori learners, Pasifika learners and learners with special learning and behaviour needs are identified, planned for and met. Fulfils the intent of the Treaty of Waitangi by valuing and reflecting New Zealand's dual cultural

heritage.

Appoints and supports the principal and assesses their performance.

What skills do trustees need?

Trustees are active leaders in their schools and need to work well in a team, ask challenging questions and have good communications skills. Boards need a balance of skills and experiences around the table to ensure effective processes for planning, monitoring, reporting and reviewing of the school's performance are in place.

What help do school trustees get?

New Zealand School Trustees Association provides free advice around employment and governance, support and resources. NZSTA also provides a variety of professional development opportunities for trustees.
